Assurance of forgiveness

When we look around at the world, we see that things aren't right. We often fall into thinking that we're doing the best we can, and we're not really the problem, but while we are pointing to others and saying they're the problem, we're lifting ourselves us by pushing others down.

Each time we come together, we confess our sins and are reminded of God's forgiveness, and we are called on, as followers of Christ, to forgive others. When we pray the Lord's prayer, we pray "Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us".

Jesus last prayer from the cross, was asking for the forgiveness of others. "Father, forgive them because they don't know what they are doing.".

It was a hard thing to do, and maybe the thing we most have to ask God's forgiveness for, is our own failure to forgive others.

So let's pray...

We do not presume to come to you Lord, trusting in our own efforts, but only in your mercy to us. We are not worthy of you, but you are the same Lord, whose nature is always to have mercy, the same Lord who, even when we were far off, sent his Son to meet us, call us and to bring us home.

Though we have turned away from you, and sought the comfort, wealth, power and prestige of the world, though we have stayed silent when we should have spoken, and spoken when we should have stayed silent, though we have turned away from those in need, and put ourselves first, though we have blamed others and failed to take responsibility, we ask you, Lord, to forgive us, to cleanse us, and to change us, for our saviour Jesus Christ's sake, so that we may live our lives to the glory of your name.

Jeremiah 31:7-9

⁷This is what the Lord says:

"Sing with joy for Jacob;

shout for the foremost of the nations.

Make your praises heard, and say,

'Lord, save your people,

the remnant of Israel.'

⁸ See, I will bring them from the land of the north and gather them from the ends of the earth.

Among them will be the blind and the lame,

expectant mothers and women in labour;

a great throng will return.

⁹ They will come with weeping;

they will pray as I bring them back.

I will lead them beside streams of water

on a level path where they will not stumble,

because I am Israel's father,

and Ephraim is my firstborn son.

⁴⁶ Then they came to Jericho. As Jesus and his disciples, together with a large crowd, were leaving the city, a blind man, Bartimaeus (which means "son of Timaeus"), was sitting by the roadside begging. ⁴⁷ When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!"

⁴⁸ Many rebuked him and told him to be quiet, but he shouted all the more, "Son of David, have mercy on me!"

⁴⁹ Jesus stopped and said, "Call him."

So they called to the blind man, "Cheer up! On your feet! He's calling you." ⁵⁰ Throwing his cloak aside, he jumped to his feet and came to Jesus.

⁵¹ "What do you want me to do for you?" Jesus asked him.

The blind man said, "Rabbi, I want to see."

⁵² "Go," said Jesus, "your faith has healed you." Immediately he received his sight and followed Jesus along the road.
